2024/2025 PRESIDENTS REPORT

Dear Members.

I am pleased to present your Club's Financial Report for the year ending 30 June 2025. Despite ongoing economic headwinds, including persistent inflation and increased operating costs, Kiama Leagues Club has delivered another year of positive results, achieving a **net profit of \$355,176** compared to \$324,729 in 2024. This outcome reflects the commitment of our Board, Management and staff to ensuring the Club remains financially strong and well positioned for the future.

FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE

Total **revenue grew modestly this year to \$12.08 million** (2024: \$11.60 million), supported by steady trading across bar, bistro and gaming operations. While revenue increased, it was offset by higher wage costs, utility charges, and a rise in marketing expenditure. Importantly, management's careful cost control and operational efficiency initiatives helped ensure that profitability was maintained and even slightly improved.

The Club's balance sheet also remains robust, with **net assets increasing to \$14.9 million** (2024: \$14.6 million). This was achieved despite significant investment in property, plant, and equipment of \$2.39 million, demonstrating our commitment to reinvesting into member facilities for the long-term benefit of the Club.

CAPITAL WORKS AND FUTURE PLANNING

This year, the Club maintained its strong focus on capital development. Following the successful opening of the Cedar Cutters Sports Bar in 2023, attention shifted to the next stages of our Master Plan. Stage 2 works, comprising upgrades to the foyer, reception, and gaming floor, were unveiled to members in December 2024, further strengthening the Club's position as a leading hospitality and entertainment venue in the region.



In the year ahead, the Club will commence refurbishment of the Bistro bathrooms and address several minor works in the Bistro, before progressing to the planning stages for the refurbishment of the main lounge

COMMUNITY AND GOVERNANCE

As always, the Club continues to prioritise its role in supporting the Kiama community. Through sponsorships, sporting partnerships, and ClubGRANTS contributions, we remain a proud supporter of local organisations, schools, and charities.

From a governance perspective, your Board continues to undertake ongoing professional development to meet legislative requirements and uphold the highest standards of accountability. We also encourage members with relevant skills and a passion for community service to consider future involvement in Board activities, ensuring strong succession planning for years ahead.

THANKS AND ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

On behalf of the Board, I extend my sincere thanks to our CEO, Jesse O'Brien, and the dedicated staff of Kiama Leagues Club. Their professionalism and commitment have been central to achieving another year of positive results in a challenging environment.

Dear Members.

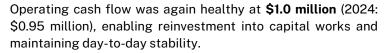
It is my pleasure to present the Chief Executive Officer's Report for Kiama Leagues Club Limited for the financial year ending 30 June 2025. This past year has been defined by consolidation, continued investment in our facilities, and strong community engagement, while navigating ongoing industry-wide challenges

FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE

The Club delivered a net profit of \$355,176 for the year (up from \$324,730 in 2024). Revenue grew to \$12.08 million (2024: \$11.60 million), reflecting the strength of our core trading areas. Our ability to deliver consistent growth, despite inflationary pressures and rising operating costs, is a testament to the resilience of our team and the loyalty of our members.

- Bar and Bistro: Sales remained strong, with members embracing Cedar Cutters Sports Bar.
 While rising wages and supplier costs placed pressure on margins, service levels and value for money remained a key focus.
- Gaming: Poker machine operations continued to underpin overall profitability, supported by investment in a new gaming lounge as well as new technology and floor improvements.
- Entertainment: Entertainment and promotions continued to engage members and guests, ensuring the Club remains a destination of choice.





CAPITAL INVESTMENT

This year saw continued investment in our facilities, with **\$2.39 million spent on capital works.** Key projects included:

- Completion of Cedar Cutters Sports Bar, which has been well received on social media and within the local community as a vibrant addition to Kiama's hospitality scene.
- Partial completion of Stage 2 renovations, including foyer, reception, and gaming relocations.
- Early scoping of **Stage 3 upgrades** to the Main Lounge, which will provide members with a modern, and comfortable entertainment hub.

While these projects reduced cash reserves from \$2.59 million in 2024 to \$1.20 million at year-end, they are essential investments in the Club's future appeal and competitiveness.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

As always, Kiama Leagues Club continues to serve as a cornerstone of the community. Through ClubGRANTS, sponsorships, and direct support, we proudly contributed to over 50 local sporting organisations, charities, and community groups.

Highlights included:

- Ongoing support of local community programs and grassroots initiatives such as Kiama Lions Club, Kiama Rotary, Kiama Parkinsons Support, Kiama Art Society, Kiama Community Radio, Kiama Probus, St Johns Ambulance Service, Kiama High School and many more outstanding groups
- Sponsorship of 10 local junior and senior sporting clubs, continuing our long-standing partnership and investment in local sport
- Hosting community events such as the Community Christmas Carols & our Annual ANZAC Day Charity breakfast, launching a Monthly Brunch in collaboration with the Barstool Brothers, and providing free School Holiday activities

Our social media stories throughout the year showcased these community connections, and illustrate our pride in bringing the community together



CHALLENGES AND OUTLOOK

The year was not without its challenges. Rising utility costs, supplier price increases, and industry-wide wage pressures impacted operations. In addition, the Club continues to manage a **contract dispute with Innovatus Projects Pty Ltd** regarding defective works. We are working toward resolution in October 2025, with expert reports and legal advice guiding negotiations. Looking ahead, our strategic priorities remain clear:

- 1. Cost control and efficiency ensuring the Club remains profitable despite external pressures.
- 2. Facility investment completing Stage 2 and preparing for Stage 3 works.
- 3. **Community focus** continuing to be a proud supporter of Kiama's sporting, cultural, and charitable life.
- 4. **Member experience** ensuring every visit to the Club reflects value, quality, and hospitality

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2025

1 Summary of Material Accounting Policies

Basis of Preparation

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Australian Accounting Standards - Simplified Disclosures of the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the Corporations Act 2001. The company is a not-for-profit entity for financial reporting purposes under Australian Accounting Standards.

Australian Accounting Standards set out accounting policies that the AASB has concluded would result in the financial statements containing relevant and reliable information about transactions, events and conditions to which they apply. Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below. They have been consistently applied unless otherwise stated.

The financial statements, except for cash flow information, have been prepared on an accrual basis and are based on historical costs, modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities. The amounts presented in the financial statements have been rounded to the nearest dollar.

The financial statements of Kiama Leagues Club Limited for the year ended 30 June 2025 were authorised for issue in accordance with a resolution of the directors on 26 September 2025.

Change in Accounting Policy

AASB 1060 General Purpose Financial Statements - Simplified Disclosures for For-Profit and Not-for-Profit Tier 2 Entities

The Company has adopted all the new and revised Standards [and Interpretations] issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board (AASB) that are relevant to its operations and effective for an accounting period that begins on or after 1 July 2024. The new and revised Standards [and Interpretations] effective for the current year that are relevant to the Company are:

AASB 2023-3 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards - Disclosure of Non-current Liabilities with Covenants: Tier 2 which clarifies when liabilities should be presented as current or non-current in the statement of financial position, including the impact of covenants on that classification. The amendments did not impact the classification of the Company's financial liabilities.

Revenue and Other Income

The company has applied AASB 15: Revenue from Contracts with Customers (AASB 15) and AASB 1058: Income of Not-for-Profit Entities (AASB 1058).

Material revenue policies are as follows:

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2025

Goods and Services

All goods and services other than those detailed below are delivered, invoiced, and paid for simultaneously. This includes sales of liquor, gaming products, and other products. Revenue is recognised immediately at the point of sale. The impact of the loyalty program has been detailed below.

Memberships

Membership is granted following payment of annual fees and in the case of new members, board approval. Payment for new members is due on application, and payment for renewing members is due within one month of the renewal date. Contract liabilities are recognised on receipt of payment, and revenue is recognised on a straight line basis over the period of membership.

Loyalty Program

Members are eligible to earn points based on their in-club expenditure. Points are redeemable against any future purchases from the club. The points accumulate and do not expire.

Advertising and Sponsorships

Advertising and sponsorships are invoiced prior to the agreed period of coverage and invoices are typically payable within 30 days. Contract liabilities are recognised when the invoices are issued, and revenue is recognised on a straight line basis over the agreed period of coverage.

Function Income

Deposits for functions are invoiced at the time of booking. Full payment for the function is typically due by the day of the event. Contract liabilities are recognised when the booking is made, and for any part payments received prior to the time of the event. Revenue is recognised at the time the function is held.

Grants

Grant revenue is recognised in the statement of comprehensive income when control of the grant is obtained and it is probable that the economic benefits gained from the grant will flow to the club and the amount of the grant can be measured reliably. If conditions are attached to the grant which must be satisfied before it is eligible to receive the contribution, the recognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

Donations

Donations and bequests are recognised as revenue when received.

Interest

Interest revenue is recognised on a proportional basis taking into account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities on the balance sheet.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2025

Trade and Other Receivables

Receivables are recognised initially at the transaction price (i.e. cost) and are subsequently measured at cost less provision for impairment. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

At the end of each reporting period, the carrying amount of receivables are reviewed to determine whether there is any objective evidence that the amounts are not recoverable. If so, an impairment loss is recognised immediately in the statement of comprehensive income.

Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Costs are assigned on a first-in first-out basis.

Property, Plant and Equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Except for certain non-depreciable assets, depreciation is provided for on a straight line basis.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable asset are:

The asset's residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at the end of each reporting period.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains or losses are included in the statement of comprehensive income. When revalued assets are sold, amounts included in the revaluation reserve relating to that asset are transferred to retained earnings.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2025

Intangibles

Poker machine licences

Purchased poker machine licences have an infinite life in accordance with the licence terms, and are carried at cost.

Impairment of Assets

At each reporting date, carrying values of tangible and intangible assets are reviewed to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired.

Where an impairment loss on a revalued asset is identified, this is debited against the revaluation surplus in respect of the same class of asset to the extent that the impairment loss does not exceed the amount in the revaluation surplus for that same class of asset.

Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, the entity estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

Trade and Other Payables

Trade and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received during the reporting period which remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

Income Tax

Under the concept of mutuality, the company is only assessed for income tax on that proportion of income derived from non-members and other external sources.

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when a legal or constructive obligation arises as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured.

Provisions are measured at the present value of management's best estimate of the outflow required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

Short-term employee benefits

Provision is made for the obligation for short-term employee benefits. Short-term employee benefits are benefits (other than termination benefits) that are expected to be settled wholly within 12 months after the end of the annual reporting period in which the employees render the related service, including wages and salaries. Short-term employee benefits are measured at the (undiscounted) amounts expected to be paid when the obligation is settled and are recognised as a part of current liabilities in the statement of financial position.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2025

Other long-term employee benefits

Employee's long service leave and annual leave entitlements are classified as other long-term employee benefits as they are not expected to be settled wholly within 12 months after the end of the annual reporting period in which the employees render the related service. Provision is made for other long-term employee benefits, which are measured at the present value of the expected future payments to be made to employees. Expected future payments incorporate anticipated future wage and salary levels, durations of service and employee departures, and are discounted at rates determined by reference to market yields at the end of the reporting period on government bonds that have maturity dates that approximate the terms of the obligations. Upon the remeasurement of obligations for other long-term employee benefits, the net change in the obligation is recognised in profit or loss classified under employee benefits expense. Obligations for long-term employee benefits are presented as non-current liabilities in the statement of financial position, except where there is no unconditional right to defer settlement for at least 12 months after the end of the reporting period, in which case the obligations are presented as current liabilities.

Member Points

The club recognises a provision for unredeemed member points, adjusted for the probability of redemption determined by historical data. Points are expected to be redeemed within 12 months.

Key Management Personnel Compensation

Key management personnel are those persons having authority and responsibility for planning, directing, and controlling the activities of the company, directly or indirectly, including any directors (whether executive or otherwise). Compensation includes all forms of employee benefits paid, payable or provided by or on behalf of the company in exchange for services rendered.

Consolidated entity disclosure statement

Subsection 295(3A)(a) of the Corporations Act 2001 does not apply to Kiama Leagues Club Limited as the Company is not required to prepare consolidated financial statements by Australian Accounting Standards.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2025

Contingent Asset - Unresolved Dispute with Builder

As at the date of this report, the Kiama Leagues Club has a legal dispute in progress with Innovatus Projects Pty Ltd.

Kiama Leagues Club has not made the final payment under the construction contract of \$343,303.30. Payment has been withheld due to incomplete and defective work.

Based on an expert builders report, the estimated costs to rectify the defective works are \$273,958,06.

Kiama Leagues currently has a liquidated damages claim against Innovatus for \$211,000.

Kiama Leagues are due to meet with Innovatus in October 2025 in an effort to negotiate a release from the contract and avoid costly litigation.

A contingent asset has not been recognised on the balance sheet at reporting date as the outcome of the dispute cannot be determined with certainty at this time.
